October was nonstop: At the club meeting we learned about the Tim Tebow Foundation and their annual Night to Shine. Then we worked helping Beacon College with their Parents Weekend. Next was the Civitan Region 2 quarterly meeting at Laurel Manor with Rich Killian speaking on the specialness of Beacon College – a 4-year learning center for the neurodivergent community of students who learn differently. Our donated decorated tree to the Special Olympics Festival of Trees brought them \$310.
